A highlight of the term has been our weekly Kinder visits. Students have visited different local and other kindergartens in small groups. The MITS students have gained confidence interacting with others, and practiced their literacy skills whilst working with small groups of children. They have learned a lot and built relationships with people from different cultural backgrounds. Students also modified a sports game in PE, to teach to their kinder kids.

In the classroom, students have been learning about Area and Perimeter in Maths and had a fantastic session working on all the different measurements on and around the Punt Road Oval.

In English, we have been studying the novel "Once", by Morris Gleitzman which is set in WW2. This has sparked many discussions, and has been the inspiration for a research project on aspects of World War 2. The students looked into what it would have been like to live through this time.

In History, the students have completed a research project on an influential Aboriginal leader and then presented their projects to the class. In Science, the class has been exploring Space, with many students performing very well on their end-of-unit open-book test.

It has been a very successful term, with many students showing academic progress across all of the curriculum areas. All the staff and

volunteers wish the students and their families, a fantastic break at home, and we look forward to you coming back for a strong Premiership Term 3 next term.

"The spirits of the old people are at the top of my design, sitting around the fire. The star at the bottom is our mother star. The white is the river flowing through my country in Arnhem Land. The red is our earth. The tracks of the kangaroo travel on the earth through the red hot desert".

My design was chosen to be made into a jumper for one of the teams, along with Naomi, Shaniya and Chris. This is the story of my design.

"The footprints on my design are of a kangaroo and the aboriginal people walking in my country near Maningrida. The red represents the hunters' spears and the semi-circles are their boomerangs. I am learning to be a hunter too."

MITS students participated in an event held at Simpson's Barracks. We watched the soldiers play AFL 9s. There were four teams and one of the teams wore my design. My team was called Brabralung which I named because that's what clan I'm from. This is about my design:

"On the shoulder is my clan shield from the Gunai-Kurnai people – my ancestors. Brabralung is one of 5 tribes in Gunai-Kurnai country. The colours at the bottom are red, orange and yellow which stands for the earth, the ground. The black represents the night sky and the blue represents the Mitchell River which flows through Bairnsdale, my home town. The footprints are those of my ancestors."

My team ended up winning first place and all of them got a trophy and I got one too. I got a photo with my team.


